

Chair Message



Dear Members & Partners,

As 2023 draws to an end, we find ourselves reflecting on the year's successes, challenges, and the immense work that still lies ahead. It's a moment to be thankful for our community, beneficiaries and supporters, who have steadfastly joined hands with us at PROFOH, inour mission to ensure life-saving surgeries and treatments, education, training, potable water, climate sustainability and poverty reduction activities. While 2023 can be seen as a difficult year for countless communities globally, that were stricken by conflict, disaster, hunger and disease, PROFOH's steady and unwavering interventions in collaboration with partners in providing quality health care, education and training, safe drinking water, have impacted our beneficiaries, so that we conducted more than 600 surgeries in Nigeria and Egypt, saw 22,197 patients who received consultations and treatments, in addition to several non-medical interventions in Ghana, Sierra lone, Uganda, Nepal, and other countries.

This year, PROFOH got incorporated in the United Kingdom, so that our flag is now flying at full mast in Great Britain, with long-standing relationships and collaboration with the Commonwealth Foundation through several Commonwealth Head of Government Meetings (CHOGM) in December 2003. Activities range from the Tolerance Summit, in support of the Royal Commonwealth Society covering schools in Nigeria and Ghana competition participation, 2009 to an official invitation to the United Kingdom Open Government Summit, 2010 and most recently the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU), with the United Kingdom International Health Care Management Association (UKIHMA) and the British Integrated Solutions Export Network (BISEN), two leading UK organizations partners of HM Government.

As Chair, I can confirm that our Board was very proud to have participated at COP 28 in the United Arab Emirates. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), climate change is directly contributing to humanitarian emergencies from heatwaves, wildfires, floods, tropical storms and hurricanes and they are increasing in scale, frequency and intensity. Research shows that 3.6 billion people already live in areas that are highly susceptible to climate change. Between 2030 and 2050, climate change is expected to cause approximately 250,000 additional deaths per year, arising from under-nutrition, malaria, diarrhea and heat stress alone, aggravated by weak health infrastructure – mostly in developing countries.

Our organization supported the COP28 UAE Declaration on Climate and Health that promotes a comprehensive response to address the adversities of climate change on health, including mental health and psychosocial wellbeing, loss of traditional medicinal knowledge, lossof livelihoods and culture. In its Declaration, it focuses on the inclusion of local communities, women and girls, children and youth, healthcare workers and practitioners, persons with disabilities (PWDs) and the most vulnerable and marginalized.

Once again, I thank all our partners including World Health Organization (WHO), Stop TB Partnership (Stop TB), Switzerland; Social Leaders Society (SLS), Egypt; United Kingdom International Health Management Association (UKIHMA), UK; British Integrated SolutionsExport Network (BISEN), UK; State Clinical Translational Scientific Research; United Nations Office and Drugs and Crime, Austria (UNODC); and the European Center for Leadership and Entrepreneurship Education (ECLEE), France for their continued support to PROFOH's work. I look forward to continuing our journey to deliver quality health care and human development for all. We, at PROFOH wish you all Happy Holidays and a Happy New Year!

Executive Director's Message



Dear Members & Supporters,

I'm very proud to share with you this year PROFOH'S ANNUAL REPORT which focuses on some challenges and victories we faced in 2023, as our commitment to reduce diseases and surgical burdens remains unshakable while fighting to preserve the lives of those individuals and communities most severely affected by diseases, lack of safe potable water, education and non-prudent policies that prolong these adversities.

For more than a quarter of a century, our organization has kept the flame of giving and supporting burning, this year, we postponed several Medical Missions due to the unavailability of funds, however, there were remarkable achievements and visibility especially on theinternational scene, as PROFOH physically attended several high-level United Nations (UN) events, such as: the UN Stakeholder Meetings, UN High-Level Meetings, Arab Health Fair, COP/28, COSP/10 and many other online meetings and events, for many years, PROFOH is also an accredited/affiliated organization with the United Nations on OSAA, OEWG Ageing.

This year, PROFOH advanced its strategic partnership with some of its members, notably the United Kingdom International Health Management Association (UKIHMA) British Integrated Solutions Export Network (BISEN). Notably, also PROFOH and UKIHMA/BISEN heldseveral days of talks in London, where parties affirmed their commitment to support international healthcare delivery globally.

In the coming years, PROFOH shall scale up its interventions in disparities associated with out-of-pocket (OOP) health care spending across communities we serve, to help elevate poverty. At the UN High Level Meeting in September, New York, PROFOH made a commitment to globally scale-up its Socialized Medicine Program -i.e. free medical missions, knowing that significant gains in poverty reduction are achieved when vulnerable populations are exempted from paying OOP when seeking health care. This is a huge challenge, needing your ongoing support to PROFOH to enable us to reduce it to the barest minimum. Notwithstanding, we have a scheduled medical mission to Cameroon Q2 of 2024 in collaboration with our value-added partner: the European Center for Leadership and EntrepreneurshipEducation (ECLEE).

With the permission of the Board, several milestones were achieved. PROFOH has been incorporated in the United Kingdom, and also PROFOH Ghana was re-certified by the government of Ghana after 13 years of its incorporation, several MOUs were signed in the UnitedArab Emirates, Ghana, India, and France. Our 2024 directions aim to accelerate social research by driving innovative solutions through our core mandates on health, education, safe potable water, poverty reduction, climate sustainability and most importantly, impacting the shaping of Policies.

In conclusion, if we were to assume for a minute that PROFOH's activities 2023 were a movie, then it would be appropriate to say that production is attributed to Chair Reem and her Board, Members and Volunteers for their dedication, in addition to our strategic partners(alphabetically) A2Z Universals, BISEN, ECLEE, ESF, MMI, SCTSR, SLS, STOP TB, UKIHMA, UNODC, WHO and many others, for their continued support of PROFOH's work. We look forward to continuing our journey towards quality health care, and human development for all.

SELECTED HIGHLIGHTS AT A GLANCE

PROFOH/CZECH REPUBLIC GROUP PROPOSED TRAINING EXCHANGE PROGRAM

Most of the communities we serve are in the developing world, they are facing many challenges, for several years now PROFOH has been receiving passionate appeals for some of these communities for training in developed countries, two groups in Prague public and privatesector. For PROFOH, this mentorship exchange program is not about predicting the future of these communities; rather it is about initiating a process of community awakening and the enhancements of technical knowledge in public health delivery, some low-level technology transfer from EUROPE to Africa. Surely it will reduce poverty activities and promote Education, Safe Drinking Water, and Climate sustainability. This call for action focuses on what we can do to start strengthening our bilateral relationships between North and South, as we all know the people-to-people relationship is the best. Currently, we are working on details, the role of PROFOH as Facilitators, the Objectives of the program, training Deliverables and service architecture, traineeship and advantages of traineeships.

PROFOH PARTICIPATED AT GLOBAL CIVIL 7 (C7) SUMMIT

PROFOH participated at the global Civil7 (C7) Summit, which was held in April, Japan, prior to the C7 Summit, a 10-member delegation consisting of C7 Steering Committee members and Working Group coordinators visited the Prime Minister's Office and handed the C7 policy proposal (Communiqué) to Prime Minister Fumio Kishida, who will be chair the G7 Hiroshima Summit. PM Kishida stated that "It isimportant to transcend the boundaries between the public and private sectors in tackling international issues, and that civil society is particularly important in leading the way toward the achievement of SDGs – a society in which no one is left behind" and that "We appreciate the policy proposals of citizens and will confirm them for use in discussions at the G7 summit. The take home of the summit was the promised of Japan collaboration with other G7 countries, partner countries and organizations, we will address global challenges such as climate change, global economy, humanitarian crisis, and food security with concrete solutions and actions. "On the second dayof the C7 Summit (14th April), the breakout sessions were held with wide-ranging discussions on sector and cross-sectors issues such asglobal food system reform. Atsushi Mimura, Director-General of the International Bureau of the Ministry of Finance, was at the stage as a representative of the Finance Track and engaged in heated discussions with civil society representatives on issues such as debt in developing countries, development finance.

GLOBAL HAND WASHING DAY

PROFOH is a member of the United Nations Water Mandate headquartered in Sweden thus have participated in several activities of theorganization. Water Mandate is working round the clock to ensure effective Water governance and global access to millions of people itsironic that water covers over 70% of earth surface, yet nearly a billion people do not have access to this most important liquid to human.PROFOH is also part of the Global Hand washing initiative, a global advocacy day dedicated to celebrating and advocating for handwashing with soap as an effective, affordable way to prevent diseases. Celebrated every October 15, it is an opportunity to design, test, and replicate creative ways to encourage people to wash their hands with soap at critical times. Post-COVID-19, hand washing has been relax in most communities Global hand washing Day provided a platform to not only raise awareness, but to also build commitment toward hand hygiene for all, in accordance with the WHO/UNICEF-led Hand Hygiene for All Global Initiative. Global hand washing Daycalled for strengthening the institutional and policy environment to drive progress for hand hygiene, ensuring the availability of handhygiene facilities and supplies, and drawing on evidence-based behavior change approaches to encourage sustained hand hygienepractices. WORLD PATIENT SAFETY DAY:

As part of organization efforts to celebrate this and her partners are very pleased to join the World Health Organization (WHO) to mark World Patient Safety Day. No one should suffer harm when seeking medical care. Yet, globally, more than 3 million deaths are linked to unsafe care each year. On 17 September, we observe World Patient Safety Day. This year WHO is focusing on the crucial roles of patients, families, and caregivers in healthcare safety. Evidence shows that when patients are treated as partners in their care, significant gains are made in safety. Patient and family engagement is a pivotal strategy to advance safety in healthcare. As users of the healthcare system with first-hand experience of the entire patient journey, the perspectives of patients, families and caregivers are invaluable in improving patient safety.

The impact of meaningful patient engagement is remarkable, with studies showing a potential reduction in the burden of harm by up to 15%, saving countless lives and billions of dollars each year. Therefore, patient and family engagement has been embedded as a fundamental principle in the World Health Assembly resolution (WHA72.6) on Global action on patient safety and in the Global Patient Safety Action Plan 2021-2030. The day aims to influence stakeholders including patients, families, policymakers, health care leaders, health workers and patient organizations to work collaboratively towards co-designing health care policies and safety interventions that truly reflect the needs and preferences of patients, ultimately enhancing healthcare safety globally. NIGERIA: DR.BRIAN CAMAZINE SURGICAL MISSION

Dr. Brian Camazine, Board member PROFOH, President Earthwide Surgical Foundation (ESF), non-profit organization, dedicated to delivering surgical care to the poor of the world by means of manpower, equipment and education and few years later he graciously agreed to serve on the Board of PROFOH, we have conducted joint surgical mission were hundreds of patients benefited from his exceptional surgical skills. This year, Dr. Camazine conducted several medical missions in different locations across Nigeria. He worked with numerous people who were critical to the work the first trip ended February 2023. Most of the work was done at Dr. Jombo's Destinyand Maternity Hospital. A total of 61 surgeries were done during this trip. In June, Dr. Camazine returned to Nigeria, Most of the work was done at Destiny and Maternity Hospital., Nkechi Hospital, Okparavero Memorial Hospital and Teresa Orsini Hospital. We also worked at two new hospitals- African Apostolic Mission Hospital and Sterling Specialist Hospital.

A total of 79 surgeries were done during this trip, most of the surgeries at Okparavero Memorial Hospital, Sapele, in Delta State were very complicated and complex. He revisited Okparavero Memorial Hospital in October, conducted 37 surgeries which comprised of thyroidectomies (19), myomectomies (8), hysterectomies (2), hernia repairs (6), mastectomies, Lipoma removal (1) and a parotid gland removal (1). He also performed 8 hernias at the Aba Prison or Correctional Center in Aba, Abia State. A total of 91 cases were done. In total, 231 surgeries were done in 2023. Dozens of doctors, nurses, medical students and nursing students received training.



Prof. Brian Camazine, is a Harvard University trained Surgeon, President Earthwide Surgical Foundation (ESF) and Board member PROFOH, He has made hundreds mission trips to Nigeria. Performed surgery in FCT, Delta, Abia, Rivers, Akwa Ibom States. During these years, 25 eventful trips, thousands of Nigerian upper-level healthcare workers participated, and they acquired valuable experience and exposure to handle complex surgical cases.

Camazine hospital location within Nigeria has been a medical Mecca for doctors, nurses, healthcare workers and medical students, including senior consultants from government-owned medical facilities. This aspect of the trip is quite unique and Surgeon is very happy to get such a strong local participation. The mandate of ESF is also provide education and manpower development, exactly what we did in Terabor, Gokana in Rivers State some years ago where we broke our records, by performing 25 bold surgeries in one single day. The Chair, Board and members of PROFOH express their profound gratitude to Dr. Camazine for his amazing dedication and call to serve.

Based on the most up-to-date data, this report shows that as of 2021, about half the world's population – 4.5 billion people – was not covered by essential health services, including 344 million people living in extreme poverty. The report stated that reaching the goal of UHC by 2030 requires substantial public sector investment and accelerated action by governments and partners, building on solid evidenceand reorienting health systems to a primary health care approach, to advance equity in both the delivery of essential health services and financial protection. According to PROFOH head of Delegation, Dr. Omo Izedonmwen lots of emphasis was placed on Data Collection and above all, Out Of Pocket (OOP) approach is mitigating against UCH. In effect, OOP health spending comprises medicines and health products; outpatient and inpatient care services, including dental care; diagnostic and laboratory services; and emergency transportationand rescue services. Medicines include over-the-counter medicines and outpatient prescribed medicines. Health products





include masks and other prevention and protective devices, medical diagnostic products and assistive products such as glasses, hearing aids, crutches, etc.

PROFOH is a member of several international groups promoting and advancing quality education globally, including International Network for Education in Emergencies, which has inspired our education interventions during our medical missions, or stand-alone Education mission or Education Emergency Interventions including the provision of several scholarships, writing desks to public schools. At PROFOH, we believes that Education is the most powerful tool to improve individual lives and societies as a whole, and deliver on the promises outlined in the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. It is important in times of peace, but even more crucial during crises. However, amidst armed conflicts, climate-induced disasters and forced displacement, education is often the first service suspended and the last to be restored. PROFOHdistribution of washable sanitary towels pads project in schools in Bwari, FCT-Abuja Nigeria was magical, the outcome was amazing, Girls Academic performances increase by almost 52%. The unique aspect of our towels –they are clinically tested and washable and could bereusable for three years

PROFOH is a member of several international groups promoting and advancing quality education globally, including International Networkfor Education in Emergencies, which has inspired our education interventions during our medical missions, or stand-alone Education mission or Education Emergency Interventions including the provision of several scholarships, writing desks to public schools. UNITED ARAB EMIRATES: PROFOH PARTICIPATED AT COP 28

PROFOH dedication to ensure that climate and the provision of quality health care go hand in hand remain very strong, placing health at the heart of climate action. This year, we are proud to have participated at UN Climate Change Conference - United Arab Emirates 30 Nov - 12 Dec_2023. The global Conference have 195 represented states 97,372 registered participants to date 1,293 media organizations. Mansur Arif Shamsi, PROFOH United Arab Emirates, Country Director UAE and , represented our organization at this year event. Heis also a member of the PROFO's Global Advisory Board and his PROFOH accreditations covers the GCC. With global temperatures hitting record highs, and extreme weather events affecting people medically and otherwise across the globe, this year's UN climate change conference, COP28, is a pivotal opportunity to correct course and accelerate action to tackle public health crisis. In an historic first, the organizers of COP28 hosted a dedicated health day in response to the climate-related health crisis affecting at least 3.5 billion people – nearly half of the global population. Extreme heat, weather events and air pollution caused millions of deaths in 2023, putting enormous pressure on health systems and workforce.

A new COP28 UAE Declaration on Climate and Health was signed by over 130 countries at the UN Climate Conference. The Declaration advocates for a rapid increase in political and financial commitments, and concrete action to protect people from the devastating healthimpacts of the climate crisis. In the lead-up to COP28, WHO, together with global health partners, mobilized the signatures of over 40 million health professionals calling for bold health and climate action at the Conference. WHO also released an Operational framework for building climate-resilient and low carbon health systems as a blueprint for a future-proof and sustainable health sector in an ever- changing climate. The Conference also discussed others pressing issues to humanity such as Health, Food, Agriculture and Water Day saw key announcements on global water scarcity and food security, as countries mobilized behind the conference Declaration on Agriculture, Food Systems and Climate Action (the Declaration), now endorsed by 152 countries, and the Water Action Agenda to keep climatically 1.5 degrees temperature within reach.





PROFOH is a ranking partner of the UNODC, we have attended similar conferences in the past, Morocco, Austria, etc. This year, Camille Bradshaw, PROFOH Advisory Board and ranking member PROFOH United States and Donmale Gbaanador, one of our organization Legal Advisers in the United States attended the historic event. Both women reported the event was fantastic and very rewarding for PROFOH. According to facts from the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) estimates that 45 percent of global citizensbelieve the health sector is corrupt or very corrupt. Approximately \$455 billion of the \$7.35 trillion spent on health care annually worldwidelost each year to fraud and corruption. Public spending for health care is inefficient in countries with poor governance, on the other hand, good governance is vital for national healthcare systems to work optimally. In fact, the quality of governance is a key mediator for whether public spending on health care influences health outcomes positively. Many strategies exist for reducing corruption and making environments less conducive to malpractice, including remunerating healthcare workers adequately, adequately financing the public healthcare system, ensuring social accountability, and strengthening institutions outside the healthcare sector. Global healthcare expenditures total \$7.35 trillion each year, much of which comes from out-of-pocket (OOP) payments by families and insurance reimbursements. Corruption is a complex and multifaceted challenge. Offenses range from smaller-scale acts by health care providers who demand bribes or "informal payments" to larger-scale acts at the ministerial or hospital administrator level when individuals in powersiphon money or redirect resources away from those who need it for their personal benefit.
